

## **PRIVACY STATEMENT - HBDRA.com**

### **Huntington Beach Downtown Residents Association (HBDRA)**

This statement sets out how HBDRA.com will treat your personal information.

HBDRA.com may collect, store and use: information about your computer and about your visits to and use of this website; information that you send to HBDRA.com using the website request form; and any other information that you choose to send to HBDRA.com.

Personal data submitted on this website will be used for the purposes specified in this privacy statement or in relevant parts of the website. HBDRA.com may use your personal information to administer the website and deal with your requests relating to the website.

In addition to the disclosures reasonably necessary for the purposes identified elsewhere in this privacy statement, HBDRA.com may disclose information about you: (a) to the extent that HBDRA.com is required to do so by law; (b) in connection with any legal proceedings or prospective legal proceedings; in order to establish, exercise or defend HBDRA.com 's legal rights.

HBDRA.com will take reasonable technical and organizational precautions to prevent the loss, misuse or alteration of your personal information. HBDRA.com will store all the personal information you provide on our secure servers. Of course, data transmission over the internet is inherently insecure, and HBDRA.com cannot guarantee the security of data sent over the internet.

HBDRA.com may update this privacy policy from time-to-time by posting a new version on the HBDRA.com website.

You may instruct HBDRA.com to provide you with any personal information HBDRA.com holds about you. Provision of such information may be subject to the payment of a fee. You may instruct HBDRA.com not to process your personal data for marketing purposes by email at any time.

HBDRA.com may use analytical programs to analyze the use of this website and generate statistical and other information about website use by means of cookies, which are stored on users' computers. The information generated relating to the website is used to create reports about the use of the website. A cookie consists of information sent by a web server to a web browser, and stored by the browser. The information is then sent back to the server each time the browser requests a page from the server. This enables the web server to identify and track the web browser. Most browsers allow you to refuse to accept cookies. (For example, in Internet Explorer you can refuse all cookies by clicking "Tools", "Internet Options", "Privacy", and selecting "Block all cookies" using the sliding selector.) This will, however, have a negative impact upon the usability of many websites.
